Legislative Update AC Transit Board of Directors January 25, 2023

## **New Session, New Members**

- 35 New Legislators, including Assembly members moving to the Senate
  - 62 Democrats in the Assembly
  - 32 Democrats in the Senate
- New AC Transit delegation members

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## **Governor's Budget Proposal**

- \$297 billion spending plan includes filling a projected \$22.5 billion budget shortfall
- The deficit would be addressed through a mix of funding delays, pullbacks, shifts and trigger reductions.
- Budget Reserves total \$35.6 billion.
  - \$22.4 billion in the Budget Stabilization Account
  - \$8.5 billion in the Public School System Stabilization Account
  - \$900 million in the Safety Net Reserve
  - \$3.8 billion in the Special Fund for Economic Uncertainties
- Governor's proposal does not dip into the reserves
- Budget Stabilization Account is maxed out, and \$951 million must be spent on infrastructure

# Budget delays, triggers, & shifts

- \$7.4 billion in Delays. The Budget delays funding for multiple items across the 2021-22 through 2023-24 fiscal years and spreads it across multiple years. Kind of a cut since there are no guarantees of a future appropriation.
- \$4.3 billion in Shifts. The Budget shifts certain expenditures in the 2022-23 and 2023-24 fiscal years from the General Fund to other funds. This includes shifting certain Zero Emission Vehicle commitments to the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund.
- \$3.9 billion in Triggers. The Budget reduces funding for certain items in the 2020-21 through 2023-24 fiscal years and places them in a "trigger" that would restore the reductions if it is determined that sufficient funds will be available. This primarily consists of placing triggers on \$3.1 billion in transportation funding.

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#### **Transportation Budget**

- Heavy-Duty Zero-Emission Vehicles and Supporting Infrastructure — \$1.5 billion reduction that is partially offset with \$839 million in auction funds
- Transit Intercity Rail Capital Program A reduction of planned funding in 2023 and 2024 from \$2 billion each year to \$1 billion in 2023-24 and \$500 million in each of 2024-25 and 2025-26. Restoration of these funds is subject to the trigger.
- Active Transportation Program A reduction of \$500 million General Fund, with \$300 million of the reduction being restored from a shift in State Highway Account funds.
- State Transit Assistance Total funding allocated through STA will decrease by about \$102 million for a total amount of \$1.06 billion in 2023-24.

- Budget deficit compounds the difficulty in addressing the fiscal cliff.
- This effort may force difficult decisions on how existing funds are allocated.
- Legislative staff are interested in addressing the needs of transit operators and have reached out to operators, including AC Transit, to learn more.
- This effort will require a coordinated regional effort to engage the Bay Area legislative delegation.
- We will be working closely with AC Transit, our legislative delegation, and transit advocates to advance our efforts.

## **Legislation Outlook**

- Start of the new session bills are starting to be introduced. Introduction deadline is February 17<sup>th</sup>.
- District staff working with CTA to secure a sponsor for a bill to provide electricity priority to transit.
- Assemblywoman Friedman has introduced two spot bills, AB 6 & AB 7, that include intent language to limit the use of transportation funds for projects that further climate goals, such as transit and active transportation.
- AB 96 (Kalra) is a renewed effort to create a process that would require transit operators to work with employee groups when considering the use of autonomous vehicles.
- Free student bus pass legislation will likely be introduced, again.
