CORE PRINCIPLES

2025 FEDERAL ADVOCACY PRIORITIES

Identify and secure long-term funding for...

- 1. Maintenance and <u>transit</u> operations, priority capital projects, and ridership recovery
- 2. <u>Our priorities in the Surface Transportation Reauthorization Act, including but not limited to, ensuring the funding levels for transit capital programs, including the Low and No Emission grant program, are continued or increased in the next authorization</u>
- 3. Transit operations
- 4. Workforce recruitment, training, development, retention, safety, wellness, and well-being
- 5. The delivery of reliable, equitable, accessible, and affordable public transportation
- 6. Addressing the District's projected, post-pandemic and inflation induced operating deficits
- 7. Sustaining and growing federal investments in bus and transit infrastructure
- 8. Investments that protect and enhance the resiliency of the District's physical, cybersecurity, operational, and human assets
- 9. Comprehensive sustainability initiatives, including but not limited to zero emission bus and paratransit program needs
- 10. Achieving compliance with federally mandated regulations

Advocate for transit-supportive laws, regulations, policies, and actions that...

- 1. Provide the means needed to ensure the District's fiscal integrity
- 2. Respond to customer needs and result in increased transit ridership
- 3. Support innovative technology initiatives, partnerships, and investments that benefit public transit and increase ridership
- 4. <u>Support efforts to grow and</u> stabilize the Highway Trust Fund and preserve, at a minimum, the 20 percent allocation to the Mass Transit Account
- 5. Reduce regulatory barriers to efficiently develop and deliver District projects and services

- 6. Require direct <u>and equal</u> representation of transit properties on Metropolitan Planning Organizations
- 7. Support the provision of zero emission bus and paratransit vehicle service and programming
- 8. Avoid new, unfunded mandates and regulations
- 9. <u>Promote equitable access to transportation and prioritize underserved and disadvantaged communities</u>
- 10. Support transportation workforce development, training and safety

05/26/25 – 05/30/25	Congressional Recess: Memorial Day Holiday
