Re: AB 361 set to expire on February 28, 2023

Dear Governor Newsom,

On February 28, 2023, AB 361 teleconference procedures are set to expire putting into effect AB 2449 through January 1, 2026. Public agencies are required to transition back to in-person public meetings held in full compliance with the Brown Act, which presents some challenges to the communities we represent.

The Alameda Contra-Costa Transit District's (AC Transit) Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) is comprised of seniors and individuals with a disability and/or agencies that represent these communities. This advisory body, as well as the community, has adjusted to the flexibility, security and convenience that virtual participation has provided, and many public agencies have benefited from increased public engagement as well. At our most recent meeting on February 14, 2023, the Committee unanimously agreed to send this request as many of the members expressed concern that they would have to resign their membership on the Committee under the new requirements.

The COVID-19 pandemic has shined a spotlight on the archaic nature of the Brown Act and the barriers it creates for an inclusive public discourse process that allows for equal and safe access for all.


The current Executive Order that essentially waives the Brown Act requirement that members of the Committee attend meetings in person has enabled those who are immunocompromised to remain safe from potential infection while participating in public discourse. It allows Committee members with medical conditions, disabilities, and/or mobility limitations to have their voices heard without compromising their safety and security. And while a hybrid meeting setting that combines in-person and remote

attendance for all meeting participants removes barriers to participation for the public, it poses unnecessary risks to the health, safety, and security of Committee members who cannot attend meetings in person and must open their teleconference locations, often their homes, to the public in order to participate as productive members of the Committee.

We are asking for your immediate intervention to extend the Brown Act requirement waiver indefinitely and uphold the continued allowance of virtual public meetings for appointed advisory bodies with memberships comprised of seniors and individuals with disabilities who are vulnerable and otherwise high risk and/or immunocompromised. We ask you and the Legislature to consider amending the law to permanently allow virtual public meetings for vulnerable populations.
